# Excellence in Agriculture recognised

### We salute our 2021 award recipients!

South Africa's top contributors to agriculture have been recognised at the Agricultural Writers SA Awards 2021. The event, sponsored by Bayer, Santam Agriculture, FNB, and Health Squared Agility Agri, gives recognition to the work of those that seek to elevate food security and rural economies.

### THE WINNERS:

Jan le Roux – Agricultural Writers SA Farmer of the Year

The Le Roux Group encompasses 654 ha of table grapes and 192 ha of prunes and nectarines. The Broodkraal farm is the biggest single table grape unit in the Southern Hemisphere, of which all production occurs under shade netting.

The Le Roux Group's export company, LeRoux Fruit Exporters, exports more than 3,2 million cartons of grapes, nectarines, and prunes each year to markets including the EU, UK, US, and the Far and Middle East.

Farming methods enhance sustainability on all levels, which includes the welfare of the surrounding community. The business employs 6 200 workers and, through the worker's trust, employees own a 32% share in Broodkraal.

Le Roux serves on many a committee and played a crucial role in the deregulation of the agricultural markets in the 1990s. His "thinking out of the box" attitude has stood him in good stead and he is well known for believing in the impossible and making it a reality.

# Agmat Brinkhuis – Agricultural Writers SA New Entrant to Commercial Agriculture



The New Entrant to Commercial Agriculture award went to Chamomile-Boerdery run by the Brinkhuis family. Liza Bohlmann, chairperson of Agri Writers SA, Nabeel Brinkhuis, Wadea Jappie, Agmat Brinkhuis, Tawfeeq Brinkhuis, and Dawie Maree, head of agricultural information and marketing at FNB South Africa.

While some empowerment projects are loudly announced but die a quiet death, Chamomile-Boerdery has stood the test of time and and is testament to the success that can be achieved through hard work.





Chamomile-Boerdery in Philippi near Cape Town is owned by Agmat Brinkhuis and his wife, Wadea Jappie. Their sons, Tawfeeq and Nabeel Brinkhuis, are also involved on the farm, where they produce herbs, vegetables, and eggs.

Agmat was the first black chairperson of the South African Poultry Association (SAPA) in 2017, while Wadea was crowned the Western Cape's Department of Agriculture's Female Farmer of the Year in 2006, 2009, and 2010.

# Prof. Gareth Bath – Agricultural Writers SA Agriculturalist of the Year

Prof. Gareth Bath has made consistent contributions to his profession through the South African Veterinary Association (SAVA) over the years. Nationally, he has acted as consultant or adviser to the SA Wool Board, National Wool Growers'

Association (NWGA), Red Meat Producers' Organisation, RPO), and the Red Meat Research and Development Trust (RMRDT), guiding policies and the funding of research.

Internationally, he guided the establishment of the International Sheep Veterinary Association, wrote its constitution, and served as its first president. He is a co-developer of the internationally acclaimed FAMACHA® system of identifying animals for selective treatment, adding to it his Five Point Check and Big Five methods for sustainable parasite control.

### Special recognition for significant contributions



A Special Award for his contribution to agriculture was given to Chris du Toit, honorary president of Agri SA. Chris received the Agricultural Personality of the Year Award in recognition of his continuous contribution towards the broader agricultural sector over many years.





# SPONSOR NEWS 2021 Santam Agriculture National Silage Competition

Plaas Media is proud to announce the finalists in its eighth Santam Agriculture National Silage Competition. Despite various challenges that had to be overcome during the sampling season, the competition was once again a huge success.

This year's instalment saw a record number of 105 entries, 79 of which were maize, 16 small grains (oats), eight sorghum, and two grass (test bales). These entries consisted of 73 bunkers, 26 silo bags, and six bales.

As in 2020, the bales category was included as a test category with a view to possible formal inclusion in the competition in future.

### THIS YEAR'S ENTRIES

A total of 23 companies and producers entered their clients or their own farms. Eleven of these companies are new to the competition.

### **SAMPLING**

The sampling was conducted by four post-graduate animal science students from various South African universities. They were Gerrit Putter and JG Els from the University of the Free State, Timothy Chilemba from the University of Pretoria, and Henlo Smit from Stellenbosch University.

These students were trained in the sampling process by Richardt Venter of AgSci, the competition's coordinator. The sample testing was conducted by Dr Elrisa Taljaard and her team at Labworld.

The analysis was done by the creator and overseer of the competition protocol, Prof. Robin Meeske of the Western Cape Department of Agriculture's Outeniqua Research Farm.

### **MEET THE FINALISTS**

There are three formal categories in which finalists are announced.



Students from three universities were trained in the sampling process. This year's training by Richardt Venter of AgSci Unlimited, took place at Westend Landgoed near Morgenzon.

namely maize, feed (forage) sorghum, and oats. There is one test category, namely silage bales, and finalists are announced in that category as well.

For the first time in the history of the competition, the top ten maize

entries are equally split between bunkers and silo bags. Among the maize finalists are three previous competition winners, which bodes for an exciting finish and speaks to the competitiveness of the entries, as well as the importance that the results have for our participants.

The Agricultural Research Council's (ARC) annual National Master Dairyman Awards competition celebrates South Africa's top commercial and small-scale achievers in the industry.

During a virtual event hosted by Agri-Expo, on behalf of the National Milk Recording and Improvement Scheme of the ARC, the winners in the various categories were announced.

The ARC's National Milk Recording and Improvement Scheme plays a critical role in the dairy industry through the provision of genetic improvement services, accredited by the International Committee for Animal Recording (ICAR). The objective of the scheme is to enhance the sustainability and profitability of production, ultimately contributing to food security, job creation and human capital development.

that an average of 71 farmers tested 10 574 cows per month and in total received 426 technical reports per month.

He added that the ARC developed an online mobile functionality to process and deliver farm management reports. "This interface allows for key information on lactation, cow production traits and cow reproduction to be readily available to the farmer on their mobile phones" he said.

# Young farmers bring hope to South Africa

The Toyota Agri SA Young Farmer of the Year and Toyota New Harvest of the Year awards were presented to the winners at a gala event held in Kempton Park recently. Both winners drove away in a brand-new Toyota Hilux 2.5D-4D Single Cab.

Beverly Joseph from the Western Cape was crowned the New Harvest farmer of the Year for 2021.

The winner of the Toyota Agri SA Young Farmer of the year 2021 is Gerhard Bruwer from Agri Northern Cape.


Annually, Agri SA celebrates and acknowledges farmers who excel in quality food production and empowering farm workers.

The competition starts with regional competitions that put all nominated young farmers through an arduous process of evaluations. Once the regional winner, one from each province, has been chosen, they then compete against each other in the national competition.

"Well done to all our farmers who received rewards for their resilience, innovation, dedication, professionalism, and caring for their workers! Agri SA is super proud of you," said Christo van der Rheede, executive director of Agri SA.

Gerhard Bruwer is a shareholder in Genade Boerdery, a mixed farming operation near Douglas, and plays a leading role in this farming enterprise. They are primarily irrigation farmers and produce yellow maize, popcorn, wheat, barley, groundnuts, cotton, lucerne, onions, potatoes, and pecans.





There is also a cattle component of commercial Bonsmaras, which is run symbiotically with the cropping component. The business is spread across three farms, with Gerhard based near Douglas, Hannes near Hopetown, and Vickie Jnr near Schmidtsdrift. Vickie Snr oversees the entire operation. Beverley Joseph made headlines for becoming South Africa's first black, female hops farmer at the young age of 32. Situated near George, Zelpy is a 50 ha farm that produces around 20 ha of bittering and flavour hops used in beer.

"My journey was difficult, but not unique if you're a woman or a person of colour trying to gain access to this industry." She was able to become the owner of Zelpy through the SAB Thrive Fund.

# Winner of the 2021 Toyota SA National Young Auctioneer Competition crowned

Despite many challenges during 2020 and 2021, Plaas Media was able to present a hugely successful eighth Toyota SA National Young Auctioneer Competition this year, one in which young Henri Beyleveldt from Limpopo took top honours. Beyleveld currently works as an auctioneer at André Kock & Seun Limpopo.

This was the second time the competition was presented in a digital format, after the format had to be amended in 2020 due to lockdown regulations. The original competition was held at local agricultural shows such as the Bloem Show and Royal Show.

Winners from these regional rounds would then take part in a national round, during which the new young auctioneer of the year would be crowned. Not only did the competition have a young auctioneer category, but it also boasted a junior category in which students could compete.

### **VIDEO ENTRIES**

To enter the 2021 virtual Young Auctioneer Competition, entrants had to record themselves while auctioning off two lots – a cow with two calves, and a sheep ram. Entrants were not restricted to specific livestock breeds and could also use props to create their videos.

These videos were received by Plaas Media and judged by a panel of three experts: Allan Sinclair, managing director of Vleissentraal Bloemfontein, Appie Maritz, auctioneer at BKB, and Barco from Niekerk, a previous winner of the competition. Each entry was judged based on a list of criteria, including contact with the audience, animal knowledge, voice, and chant. These criteria have applied since the competition's inception.

### 2021 YOUNG AUCTIONEER FINALISTS AND WINNERS

The 2020 winner, and first winner of the digital-format competition,

was Hennie Goosen, a master's student from the University of the Free State. Previous winners were André van Zyl (2014), Gareth Hughes (2015), Steven Mathews (2016), Gavin Mathews (2017), Barco van Niekerk (2018) and JP Marais (2019).

It was a close race among this year's top candidates with less than five points separating first and second place.


